## Fall Ordeal Scheduled for September 17-19

The 2004 Fall Ordeal of Un A Li'yi Lodge will be held on the weekend of September 17-19 at Camp Ho-non-wah. All lodge brothers are invited and encouraged to come out and join in on a weekend of cheerful service.

The cost for the weekend will be \$20.00 per Brother. This fee includes your food for the weekend and the function patch. If you are going for Brotherhood, the cost is \$40.00 per Brother. This additional fee includes your Brotherhood sash and flap. Check in for all Brothers will be from 5:00 PM to 7:00 PM on Friday night in the Trading Post. Dinner will be served at 6:30 PM on Friday night.

All brothers must bring their own tents to this function. The cabins in New Shirmer and Matigwa are reserved for the Ordeal candidates/new members. The lodge

membership will be camping by Lodge Chapter.

What to bring: your uniform, sash, work clothes, work gloves, hand tools, & power tools (adults only). Be sure you label all of your personal tools. Also, all youth members (under 18) must bring the parental consent form, sent to you via separate letter from the lodge chief.

We have a good bit of work to get done in getting camp closed down for the winter along with the permanent projects we have been working on. Also, we are expecting a large number of Ordeal candidates to be inducted into the lodge during the weekend. Let's all turn out and welcome our new Brothers into the lodge and make this the best Ordeal in lodge history. We hope to see you there.

## Petitions For Lodge Officers Due

Any youth member planning to run for a lodge office for 2005 must submit a petition with the signatures of at least 20 other youth members in order to be considered eligible to run for a lodge office. Candidates for all lodge offices must submit their petitions to lodge chief Chris Leeper by the Saturday night cracker barrel at the Fall Ordeal. Lodge officers must be under the age of 21 during their entire term of office. The election will be held during the weekend of the Fall Fellowship in December. The officers are: Lodge Chief, Lodge Vice Chief of Administration, Lodge Vice Chief of Program, Lodge Secretary, and Lodge Treasurer.

## Are You Eligible for the Brotherhood Honor?

From the beginning of our Order in 1915, all members have been equal. There are no ranks. As an Ordeal member, you are entitled to all rights and privileges of membership in the Order. Yet, so important is the induction sequence that the Order strengthened it by creating the Brotherhood membership. It is an opportunity for members to evaluate their unit service since their Ordeal induction.

Brotherhood membership is sought by Arrowmen seeking to reaffirm their belief in the high purposes of the Order. Before becoming a Brotherhood member, each Arrowman makes a special effort to serve his troop or team. Each Brotherhood member commits to even to even more service to Scouting through the Order.

Completing your Ordeal set you on the next part of your "long and toilsome journey," applying what you learned in your Ordeal to your life. When you have learned about the ideals of the Order and made them a part of your life, you may become a Brotherhood member. Becoming a Brotherhood member marks the completion of your induction into the Order of the Arrow.

Are you eligible for the Brotherhood Honor? If it has been 10 months since your Ordeal and you have continued to serve your unit or in Scouting; you are eligible. You must meet five challenges before you can enter the Circle of the Brotherhood. They are:

1. Memorize the signs of Arrow membership. Memorize the Obligation of the Order, the Order of the Arrow Official Song, the Admonition, the sign of Ordeal membership, and the arrow handclasp.
2. Advance in your understanding of the Ordeal. Gain a thorough understanding of the Ordeal through which you have passed. See "The Customs and Traditions of the Ordeal" in your OA handbook.
3. Serve your unit. Maintain your registration in Scouting. During a period of at least 10 months, strive to fulfill your obligation by continuing and expanding your service to your unit or position in Scouting.
4. Plan for service in the lodge. Keep your lodge dues paid up. Be aware that acceptance of Brotherhood membership involves a pledge of future service to the lodge. Develop a concrete idea how you plan to fulfill this pledge.
5. Review your progress. When you feel you have met the four challenges above, write a letter to the lodge secretary. In this letter, explain what you think the Obligation means, describe how you have been fulfilling this obligation in your unit and in your daily life, and how you have used your understanding of the Ordeal to aid in your service, and describe your specific plans for giving future service to the lodge program. This letter should be written before you come to camp.

The opportunity for you to attain Brotherhood will be available to you at both the Fall Ordeal and the Fall Fellowship. If you are eligible, we strongly encourage you to seal your membership in the Order and attain the Brotherhood honor.

This past Spring Fellowship was a hit! On Friday night, the brothers arrived and participated in some fun games and got a chance to test their skills on the climbing wall. Saturday morning brought a few hours of cheerful service as the Lodge helped set up tents and cots for Summer Camp. Later that night Ordeal members had some more fun while everyone else attended the Brotherhood ceremony. We had two brothers attain the Brotherhood honor, Bryan Coffey and Robert Day. ### 2004 Dixie Fellowship Review

On the weekend of April 23-25, around 1200 Arrowmen from the eleven Section SR-5 lodges descended on Clear Creek Scout Reservation near Charlotte to attend the 2004 Dixie Fellowship. Catawba Lodge #459 of Mecklenburg County Council served as host lodge for the 52<sup>nd</sup> annual gathering of the Dixie Fellowship lodges. The spirits were high and the competition tough as all 11 lodges participated in training and competitions throughout the weekend.

Un A Li'yi Lodge sent a spirited 76 delegates to this year's Dixie. With a Christmas theme, our red Santa hats and Christmas t-shirts were seen throughout the weekend. Unfortunately for us, Santee Lodge had a slightly better Christmas theme as they edged us out in winning the Spirit Award.

As for the competitions, this was one of Lodge 236's better years in competing in all the Dixie events. In the 45 group and individual competitions, Un A Li'yi placed first, second or third in 26 of these events, more than any other lodge. Congratulations to all of our winners and a special thanks to our Dixie committee for coordinating all of our craziness throughout the weekend. Here's how we did in the competitive events:

### 2004 National Order of the Arrow Conference Review

Over 10,000 Arrowmen from around the world attended the 2004 National Order of the Arrow Conference (NOAC), held at Iowa State University in Ames, Iowa the first week of August. The delegates participated in numerous training sessions and outdoor activities such as TOAP (Total Outdoor Active Program) and "Leave No Trace" camping. There were also numerous competitions in individual and group dancing, team singing, ceremonies, athletic events and mental and skill competitions. Each evening had a tremendous show and the week was filled with activities including the Founder's Day Festival, which is perhaps the greatest OA carnival ever held.

Un A Li'yi Lodge sent a delegation of 14 members NOAC. Also, 7 lodge Brothers worked on NOAC staff.
